






















BIGGEST LITTLE AIRSHOW IN ARIZONA

We did have show and tell. Randy Meathrell brought his Nitro Planes Spitfire and his combat ship. Bob Shanks and Rick Nichols brought


their combat ship versions. Chris Myhre brought in his superb scale Omniflight helicopter. Tom Wells showed the little foam WWI scale looking SE-5

ALWAYS SAFETY

We are in the midst of our flying season and experiencing a lot of unusual wind almost daily it seems. So be caught fire so use your LiPo safe and take care taking off and landing as our wind can play havoc when trying to line up on the runway. We hope to have the alternate "weed abatement" runway operational as so as we can get some rain to help pack down the dusty runway.

The new AMA *Model* Aviation magazine has a safety item regarding the

use of LiPo battery bunker ceramic charging jug that held a modeler's battery that bags or some kind of a protection for charging. Don't ever leave a LiPo while charging in your workshop, they need to be monitored.

Another AMA item was a note on building a comfortable assembly frame for models at the field or in your workshop. We need to protect our backs and not stoop so much over our work

areas. A creative modeler made his own adjustable model assembly table, on page 84.

Be careful with CA, it can get hot enough to cause a blister and even a more serious burn if the conditions are right.

Since we are having a lot of modelers going to electrics, we must remind you all again about not arming your plane under the cabana but do so in the pit area. Along with this reminder is too keep

back of all props and especially sharp electric props.

We have in these pages also discussed workshop safety. Sometimes we get in a hurry to finish a project or get things done so we can go fly but hurrying can be a real safety hazard.

Use a spotter if we have a number of folks flying, just plain common sense folks. We have quite a mixture of helicopters, gas, glow, and the silent electrics armed with ferocious batteries!
